Summary of the Annual General Meeting

The Annual General Meeting (AGM) was held in a spacious room at the Richelieu-Vanier Community Centre on the evening of May 11. This was the first in-person AGM since 2019, and it was also hosted on Zoom. About 20 people showed up in person, and a few more attended online.

The new Executive Committee members were once more acclaimed to their positions. Catherine Garret was the only nominee for Treasurer. She replaces Rita Hudec, who had been in this role for more than twenty years, and who chose to retire. Before the vote, each of the committee members briefly described their roles. President Kerry Day and Vice-President Matthew Poirier encouraged people to volunteer for these executive positions, because the committee

members have not changed since 2019. Unfortunately, there were no other nominees.

At the next Executive Committee meeting on June 8, the executive will appoint the Chairs for various roles and functions of the club. Some of these positions have been unfilled for almost ten years due to a lack of volunteers.

After the vote, the minutes from the last AGM meeting were reviewed and accepted by vote.

There was discussion about finding a new location for the club workshop. The club is still responsible for the leased space at Colonnade Road for one more year, which counts as debt. The landlords that were approached were uninterested in a short-term rental. Meeting attendees agreed that the club should ask a real estate agent for help to find an appropriate space.

Club members can help with the search. A workshop must meet basic requirements of being 1000 square feet in area, have a reliable water source and appropriate drain pipe such as a nearby sewer drain, and an ample electrical panel.

The club's for-profit status was discussed briefly. For a long time, the club has considered becoming a non-profit organization, which would open some doors in finding a new studio and maybe some government grants. One of the first hurdles is clearing all of the debts of the current organization. The executive will review the opportunities in May 2024.

<u>Rita Hudec, Treasurer Report:</u> The club financials are in good shape, with \$58,000 held in GICs and \$34,000 held in cash. The report was reviewed by Karyn Sheridan, CPA, CA. Club members who would like a copy of the full report must send an e-mail to <u>treasurer@olmc.ca</u>.

Present members voted to re-hire Karyn Sheridan to be the auditor in 2023.

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The Art of Tool Maintenance

Information and tips to keep your machinery in good condition, as presented in the Silversmiths meeting held on 2022-02-23.



Tumblers

Small rotating tumblers from Lortone are popular for tumbling rock and polishing metal. Often the machines work fine for a while, and then they start "sticking" — not rotating properly or not at all. A lot of people then put the tumbler on a block to put it on a tilt, but eventually that workaround will also fail. Two Videos on the Lortone site show how to fix this problem

(https://lortone.com/pages/instructions). In summary:

- change the gear belt if it gets loose or worn out
- there are two screws on the outside that let you move the motor to put more tension on the gear belt (or you may need to open up the top to reach the screws)
- the bearings on the axles need to be oiled with a light oil on a regular basis
- The pebble on the barrels can wear off, so the barrel lacks friction to grip to the axle. Just wrap some elastic bands around the outside of the barrel.

Stainless steel shot used in a tumbler sometimes gets contaminated and turns a dark colour. Pieces come out shiny, but they have a dark stain. Run the tumbler again with flat or decarbonated soda pop (coca cola).

Clean and Unclog Your Files

Over time, the gaps in files can get filled with material and become ineffective. There are many actions to clean them depending on the situation.

- whack the file against a block of wood or your bench to knock material loose;
- run a file card (steel wire brush) along the surface. Some people use a regular plastic tooth brush;
- dip the file in alcohol and light it to burn off grease;
- immerse it in citric acid to remove surface material;
- bend the file to suit your needs (you probably need to heat it up first);
- hold the file in a pin vise, and use a needle to scrape and pick off bits;
- use a 5remel tool or flexshaft tool with a brush attachment to scrape clean the surface;
- to remove rust, coat the file with CLR for a few minutes, then brush off and dry the file
- to prevent rust, store the files in a sealed container with dessicant packages that you might get as packaging from other products
- Copper can be gummy and tough, seeming to catch often. Try coating your file in chalk to discourage sticking. But for saw blades, use a wax coating.

Foredom Flex Shaft

Good lubrication is important. Never let the hand piece hang down when not in use. When hanging, the grease inside the tool will collect at the bottom. Eventually this will cause serious





problems. Always remove it from the shaft and store it horizontally, or leave it connected and make sure it sits horizontally on the bench.



A new foredom comes with a guide on how many hours of use before it needs lubrication. There is a small set screw on the shaft attached to the motor. Loosen the screw, and remove the hand piece to pull down the sheath the surrounds the shaft to the handle. The whole shaft can also be removed from the motor.

There are two little screw holes near the top of the motor that attached to carbon brushes. These brushes wear out over time and must be replaced. Be careful not to lose the spring. They start out ¾ inch long. When they get down to ½ inch, the foredom stops working.

Rolling Mill

Polish the rollers: cut a wooden dowel to the wide of the rollers. Wrap a soft cloth around the dowel and feed it into the rollers. The dowel will be pressed against one side while the rollers spin. Put some metal polish on the cloth against the rollers to polish. Some people just hold the cloth against the roller.

How to keep the sheet straight when pulling it through the machine

- 1. There are little holes above the bearings on either side of the frame that must be oiled. There is also a little hole on top of the gear box to oil the gears.
- 2. Re-calibrate the machine. Tighten the gauge indicator disks (each notch is 0.1 mm) until there is no space between the rollers, no light coming between them. Remove the handle. Use the dials on the gauge indicator disks to reset them to zero (arrows point to zero). Re-install the handle.
- 3. Try to mill as close to the middle of the rollers as possible. The roller edges might be curved.
- 4. If the metal sheet is cut with shears on one side and with a saw on the other side, the difference in roughness can cause the sheet to curve while rolling.

Power

Power tools need a certain wattage of electricity to start up properly (1 Watt = 1 Volt * Amperage). If voltage (analogous to water pressure) is low from a wire that is too thin or too long, then it must work harder to increase the amperage (strength of current). This electrical flow problem can damage the motor and cause overheating or even a fire. That is why it is recommended that small motors be plugged directly in to an electrical outlet instead of through an extension cord or through a typical power bar. There are good cords and power bars on the market, but they are expensive.

Pliers

Edges of the pliers are too sharp. Use 600 or 1000 grit sandpaper to grind down the edges of the prongs. Recommended for chain nose, flat nose, needle-nose.

Hammers

If you hammer is made of a soft steel, it may get nicked from use, or missing and hitting the anvil. Polish the peen regularly to remove small nicks.





Historic Pakenham Stone Bridge

The historic Pakenham limestone bridge was built at the turn of the twentieth century to make a crossing over the Mississippi River at Pakenham (amalgamated in 1998 to create Mississippi Mills). The bridge measures 82 metres long, 6.7 metres high, 7.6 metres wide, with five 12-meter-wide spans. The structure was re-engineered in 1984, so that it could handle modern traffic loads.

Limestone is abundant in the area, and is relatively easy to mine. It was a common building material at the time.

In fact, there is a limestone quarry very close to the bridge site, about 0.3 km east on Kinburn Side Road (Highway 20) and across from the Stonebridge Haven retreat centre. Interested people can contact WRC Contracting for pick-up and delivery.

Plus there are fossils. If the water level of the Mississippi River is low, one can walk (carefully!) onto the exposed flat rock on the south side of the bridge (upstream), and possibly see some fossils of marine animals from when the land was covered by a subtropical ocean 450 to 500 million years ago.

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Dolomite

Dolomite is a sedimentary calcium magnesium carbonate CaMg(CO₃)₂ that forms rhombohedral crystals with curved faces. Small amounts of iron may give it a yellow or brown hue. A high amount of magnesium makes a rosy colour. It can also be white or gray. Lead, zinc, and even cobalt may be substituted for magnesium.

In a powdered form, it will fizz in weak hydrochloric acid like calcite does. It has a Mohs hardness of 3 1/2 to 4.

It is often associated with barite, fluorite, pyrite, chalcopyrite, galena, or sphalerite in hydrothermal veins.

Dolomite dissolves in acidic water and rarely survives long in exposed environments. Aquifers and karsts are likely to form from it. So-called modern dolomite has formed in supersaturated saline lagoons in Brazil and the Persian Gulf, and some hypersaline lakes.
