

June was a busy month in the silversmith workshop. Karla Fox, a member of both Kingston Lapidary and Mineral clubs and the OLMC, offered two enamelling courses: "Intro to Enamelling" and "Cloisonné". Both filled quickly and all participants left with beautiful enamel pieces, and a love for the technique. Karla will offer more courses starting in August.

She will also start an Enamelling Open Workshop on some Thursday nights in the Fall. Intro to enamelling or demonstrated enamelling experience is a prerequisite for this open workshop. Participants must wear N95 masks at all times when enamelling powders are in use due to the danger to the lungs.

Don Alp offered two popular beginner silversmith classes: "Make a Simple Ring", and "Make a Bezel Pendant". All participants went home with a beautiful, finished project.

Participants can bring a stone to set and make into a pendant, or add to a ring. Silver for a setting up to 25 x 15 mm will be supplied, and the class will cover making the bezel, soldering the bezel to the base and adding a jump ring and bail.

12,000 years ago... in E-stone-ia

Part of the <u>Viimsi Shopping Centre</u> in Haabneeme, Estonia, was built around a 10,000-12,000 year old <u>glacial erratic boulder</u>. It is a common sight in the country littered with these large stones, often more than 30 meters around.



Bangkok's Jewelry Trade Center

The JTC is a 59-story mixed-use skyscraper in Bangkok, Thailand. It is now the eighth-tallest building in Thailand, and it is among the largest centers for selling, sourcing and distributing jewelry in Asia. The building houses the gemtesting laboratory operated by the Asian Institute of Gemological Sciences (AIGS) and their gemological school, the Bangkok Fashion Mall, and suppliers of loose gemstones, rough stones and jewelry from around the world. Don't skip the 320-seat food terrace, either.

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carbonate, which gives it a beautiful, dramatic patterning that takes a nice polish. It is named after the Vancouver Island road where it was found.

CCFMS Spring Update

- 1) New CCFMS President We are very happy to announce that the new CCFMS president is Chris Fouts. The Stuart Sapphire

The <u>Stuart Sapphire</u> is an ovoid table cut blue sapphire that forms part of the British Crown Jewels. It weighs 104-carats (21 g) and measures 3.8 cm by 2.5 cm. Probably it came from Asia. Despite having some flaws, the Stuart family deemed it of high value. It is one of several famous gemstones on the crown, including the Black Prince's Ruby, the Cullinan II Diamond, and St. Edward's Sapphire.

The sapphire has been handed down and repurposed by various members of the British royal family over the years. James VII carried it to France while fleeing the Revolution of 1688, eventually bequeathed to Henry Benedict, Cardinal of York, who wore it in his mitre. He sold the sapphire and other relics in 1799. At some point, someone drilled a hole at one end of the stone, maybe so that it could be worn as a pendant. Eleven years later it was purchased by King George IV, who had it mounted into a clasp of an armlet with 355 diamonds for his mistress at the time.

For Queen Victoria's coronation, the stone was placed in the front of her new crown. In 1909,


Edward VII had it moved to the back of the crown to make room for the Culinan II diamond.

Gem Cut Design: Table Cut

The table cut is one of the earliest diamond cuts where the top point of the octahedral diamond crystal is removed to create a flat surface known as the 'table'. In some cases, the bottom point is also removed to form a flat rectangular base known as the 'culet'. It first emerged in the 14th century, and was a natural progression from the old style of simply polishing the facets of the natural crystal.



Cabochon Girdles

When lapidarists make cabochons, they have a choice on how wide to make the girdle. Very small girdles might be more suited for wire wrap, or would require the bezel to cover part of the stone, plus the stone edge may be prone to cracking. Girdles of one or two millimeters high may be better suited to fit in a bezel wall. Some on-line stores sell cabochons with even wider girdles (and low domes or no domes), and they seem to be popular for ornamental work. What is your preference?
